misappropriated. And in the first amendment, on page 3, it strikes "thirty". And that has to do with the lifetime fishing permit. And then on page 12 there's a...we want to strike "twenty" and insert "twelve". And that deals with fur buyer's permit. And then the third one, on page 22, we want to strike "seventy-eight" and insert "seventy-five". And that has to do with boating permits. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. There are several lights on. I'm going to ask members if they wish to address the amendment or wait to address the bill. This is AM0058. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, I think I put my light on a little too soon. The Chair of the committee hasn't spoken yet, and I would yield what time he would like to the Chair, if he would wish to speak to the amendment or to the bill generally.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Beutler yields his time. Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I would prefer to speak on the bill. The amendment is technical. Some mistakes were made on the numbers given to us, and Senator Stuhr's amendment is an attempt to clean that up. So I think it's probably...I would rather speak on the bill after the amendment is addressed. But either way works.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Senator Beutler, you still have four and a half minutes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I just wanted to make one quick comment in support of the bill and in support of the way the Natural Resources Committee has handled this. Prior to 1993, the Natural Resources Committee used to be flooded with individual fee bills. You can look on the list of fees that are encompassed in the bill today, and imagine what it was like to have an individual fee bill suggesting a dollar or two increase here, there, and everywhere, before a legislative committee that's basically designed to lay out broad policy decisions, and not, in my opinion at least, to become encumbered by the
