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Because when I'm on this floor, I'm looking at costs that the government is going to impose on citizens of this state, and citizens of other states who come into this state. My personal predilections don't intervene here, because if I had my way, I would charge \$5,000 every time somebody went out to kill an animal. But we're not doing it my way. We're doing it you all's way. And your way is supposed to be the fair way. So I want it to be fair. Senator Cudaback raised an issue. These fees have not been raised in ten years, we're told. I don't know whether that's true or not. If they haven't been raised in ten years, it means that the last time they were raised they were raised too much. And there's no intent to raise them now, so they still have enough money coming in. So they overcharged on the fees, and have been doing that all the time. The very argument they give to try to trick you all into going forward is the argument that undercuts what they're trying to do. They've been overcharging. They've got enough money. What does inflation have to do with chronic wasting disease? What does it have to do with West Nile virus? What does it have to do with scrapies? Inflation? That's a word that's thrown into everything. But if I want to talk about inflation and how it impacts on the poor, nobody wants to hear it here. But when you're talking about trying to find a way to give a bureaucracy a way to get more money than it needs, and it's got too much already, then you want to talk concepts that more appropriately should be applied to those who do suffer great need. There was an old prophet named Amos. And he said, the poor are sold for a pair of shoes. A few days ago...the man happened to be black...in effect, froze to death sitting on a bench in downtown Omaha. The poor die every day in every way, and who is there to shed a tear for the poor? Where are the poor buried? There's no remembrance of the poor. But my job is not just to see only to the poor; it's to see after the interest of everybody whose interests are affected by what we do in the Legislature. And I'm not going to submerge the interests of the public to the whims of a bureaucracy which serves the elitists. That's why Game and Parks gets what they want. Because they are the ones who, when the pop their finger, people jump. I haven't heard senators stand on this floor and say, imagine how much more it costs a poor person to make it now than it did ten years ago, because of inflation, therefore we're going to protect them.
