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don't fight to kill in most instances, they fight to protect their territory. And when the interloper has been put to flight, the one whose territory it is has no further interest in that individual. But it does not attack every animal in that territory, but only the animals of its own species, which will compete for what is needed to sustain life. In laboratories they conduct experiments with smaller animals by giving them a cage and allowing the animal to stay there long enough to develop a feeling of territoriality. Then they introduce an interloper, and the animal will behave in a characteristic fashion. Those who want to see what impact genes may have on aggression will alter a gene that they think comes into play. They will then introduce one of these gene-altered critters into the cage of the critter that has developed that sense of territoriality,...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and if the one whose territory it is has had that gene altered, that animal will attack much more readily and much more ferociously than one whose basic instinct, or whatever you want to call it, inclination toward aggression, has not been altered. When these things are known, there is more to this idea of killing animals than just going out there and satisfying that perverse sense of pleasure that human beings have. I'm going to broaden our discussion this morning, and every time we're on these Game and Parks bills. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members. Senator Chambers talked a little while ago about us playing fast and loose with these funds. And I think that often there is a concern that we play fast and loose with cash funded agencies. And one of the things that we talked about yesterday is, this is an agency that used to be 70 percent general funded, and is now less than 30 percent general funded. And so I'm back to the idea that we really need to make sure that we have made the connection between whether the fee is appropriate, and also to have some faith in the systems that we have in place. I think the Appropriations
