to lure an animal unsuspectingly to an area where you're going to kill it with a high-powered weapon, when you use lures to attract that animal to a place where it can readily and easily be killed? How can you call it sport when you have an enclosed area with semi-tame creatures and you pay somebody to let you go out there and shoot that animal that has no fear of you, is not aware that you are nature's number-one and bloodiest predator? Human beings are the most deadly, ferocious, murderous predators on the face of the earth, because human beings are the only ones who kill purely for pleasure. When somebody tells me about hunting on the floor, I want them to tell me the nature of this pleasure that they derive from killing. What part of the brain is stimulated by a pleasurable...or, that generates this pleasurable sensation? Is it in line, in its effect, with that produced by VIAGRA? Is this preparatory to some other activity or interrelationship between a male and a female human being? Is he stimulated by being blooded in the way that you stimulate a fighting animal by blooding it on little animals, let it rip those little animals to shreds? And we call that a terrible thing. But when human beings do it with high-powered weapons, it's something else. It is...I hate to use the term...it is lionized. They talk about the greatness of some of these people like Ernest Hemingway, who was supposed to be a great white hunter. And these white people would go out with these guns and have the native population show them where to go and how to set up to kill these creatures which are no threat to them and will not be a threat to them. When they go to the Indian continent and hunt tigers, they will have somebody let them sit up in a tree. Then other unarmed people, with just noisemakers, coming to the tiger's territory and running that tiger beneath that tree so the great white hunter can kill it. Then that hunter takes the hide, sticks the head on a wall, and puts the fur on the floor in the form of a rug, and is praised and lauded for courage. There is something very perverse, from my point of view, and perverted, from my point of view, about this so-called hunting activity.
