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concerned. And when they have their little boys posing with an animal that he killed, and the daddy is proud and the little boy is taught to be proud, I think society has to do some reevaluating. But again, that's my point of view. I'm not a hunter. Other people are. They think it's wonderful. They think it's glorious. So we have different points of view. I had to touch on that, so that those issues will not get lost in what I'm saying against these fees. Remember, even with my aversion toward hunting, I'm opposed to giving carte blanche authority to raise these fees on people who want to do the hunting.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, members of the body. Senator Stuhr, I was prompted to speak because of comments made by Senator Janssen. Deer, in my area, are a problem. And we...and it's in a city area, that they can't shoot them. But is there some way...the way that they have to be...animals have to be hunted, I guess, is by bow and arrow. Is that under the control of the Games and Parks, is one question. And is that regulated by this measure? Senator Stuhr?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Stuhr, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR STUHR: Yes, I believe it would be regulated under Game and Parks. It's my understanding they probably allow so many permits for bow hunting.

SENATOR HARTNETT: So that...in your sheets that you have, that would not be raised or changed? Is that...for the...or maybe they don't charge them a fee.

SENATOR STUHR: Yes, I'm sure they do.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Maybe I'll ask somebody...
