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you all can wear me out. Then they'll eventually pass it in the form that it's in. Then we come to the next bill, then the next one, then the next one, and Game and Parks is the one that will be running this Legislature, not Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers is a mere pawn in the hands of an unkind fate. Senator Chambers has been placed on a track from which he cannot derail himself. So I must follow the path that I'm being forced on by Game and Parks, and that...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...path carries me through every bill that I think needs to be dealt with. Did you say time, Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes, I did, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, the other day I had delivered to my office a piece of work of the kind I had never seen presented or constructed in this Legislature before. It came from a senator who was putting together a comprehensive proposal. There are bright colors. There are lines. There are figures. There's information. It is pleasing to the eye. It will engage the mind. It invites you to pay attention to what is there. That was the impact it had on me. When we get to that, there are people who will have much to say, I'm sure, and I will have much to say, perhaps. Because I don't have to say anything if I don't want to, or I can say a lot if I choose to. I'm going to repeat again that Game and Parks gave Senator Stuhr a bill to carry. Why did they select Senator Stuhr? I have even less in common with the people who run Game and Parks than I do with my colleagues here, because I've at least had a chance to study some of my colleagues in this environment. I don't know what's going through the head of those people at Game and Parks. But a general practice of a lobbyist or a bureaucracy is to put a bill in the hands of somebody who doesn't know any better, as is the case with some of our brand-new senators, who were given those
