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SENATOR CHAMBERS: What does it go for?

SENATOR SCHROCK: It would be for regulatory purposes, to help with the game commissioners and so on and so forth, and the overall overhead that is incurred by an agency like the Game and Parks.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is there a separate discrete fund where the habitat money goes and where the aquatic money goes?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Absolutely, Senator Chambers. They are separate funds. They got for separate purposes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is there extra money...how much money is in the habitat fund?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I can't answer that, but I can find out if you want to know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, that, and the aquatic fund. Now when you say the people who fish came to the Legislature or went to Game and Parks, these would be like clubs or organized people who can...

SENATOR SCHROCK: Sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So the ordinary citizens really would not even be aware, necessarily, that this activity was going on.

SENATOR SCHROCK: You know, there's a lot of ordinary citizens that belong to the bass club, to the walleye club, to the...to the...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, let me say it like this.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...Pheasants Forever.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: "Nonclub" members.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yeah, "nonclub" members.
