they don't need the money. I earlier read the statement of the income being about \$51.6 million, and total operating cost of \$53.6 million. So the idea that additional funds are not needed, I totally disagree with you, Senator Chambers, in that area. And I have shared with you previously some of the education programs and such that are sponsored and done by the Game and Parks Commission across the state. Again, this bill just proposes a cap. That cap has not been changed in ten years. I don't think any of us could operate a business without having some increase in our cost. This does not mean that this is going to go into effect immediately. As we said, the commissioners can...they will need to set a public hearing. People have the opportunity to come and voice their concerns about the issue at the public hearing. So we are looking at trying to maintain the resources that we have so that we can do a better job of rural development, economic development in our state to lure people to come and do their hunting and fishing, and also to encourage our residents to take part in many of these family activities. Thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Stuhr, if Game and Parks needs over a million dollars to close the gap between expenditures and what they have, where do they expect to get that money to close the gap?

SENATOR STUHR: From monies that...their cash fund. There is some additional money, just like all of us put some money away for savings. But as things continue to go on, you deplete that amount.
