SENATOR SCHROCK: I'm cleaning out my billfold here. I've got an old hunting and fishing permit with a couple stamps. Would you like to...would you like that?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I take your word for it. That's why I just...

SENATOR SCHROCK: All right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...ask you and take your word for it.

SENATOR SCHROCK: All right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Where would a person not need a park permit to fish? In other words, what areas can fishing be engaged in without it being on a park...at a park?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Well, there's a lot of recreation areas in the state. There's a lot of private land that has water on it. There's a lot of sandhill lakes. When I grew up, I had a pond on the place we farmed. I used to catch a lot of bullheads. I thought I was a big time fisherman too, by the way, when you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you have to have a fishing license to fish on your own property?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, you do, unless you're under 16.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If we deal with hunting, you have to...is there...there is no hunting in any park area, is there?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I'm not aware of it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Although that might not be totally true. Robinson State Park, they may have some limited hunts there.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if that were the case, then you would need to have a park permit also.
