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SENATOR SCHROCK: Well...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to stop it from happening, because I think it's not good legislating.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Well, let's take a survey around here and see how many of these senators would like to prioritize this bill next year and commit their priority to it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I don't think any senator with two brain cells working together would prioritize it to pass.

SENATOR SCHROCK: You may be correct there, but it's still housekeeping that we need to take care of.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Members of the Legislature, this is far more than housekeeping. This goes to the philosophy of legislating; the attitude we're going to take with reference to fees. Am I to believe that every fee bill is going to have the same easy ride through the Legislature that this one is having? And if not, why not? Would you be telling me that the areas in which fees are to be increased by those other bills are not as important as Game and Parks? No, you wouldn't tell me that. You probably won't even remember this discussion, but I will, and I'm trying to drill it into our minds. Because whatever happens with this bill, the issue is not at an end. The only thing that would stop me from talking about this bill any further this session is if we bracket it, if we kill it, or if the introducer asks that it be passed over. There is another course that can be taken, but I would have to comment a bit for us to reach that point. Change the bill so that it raises the fees by six percent and attach Senator Schrock's delayed...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...effective date, and then you would be through with me on this bill. Otherwise, I've got more coal to dig, I've got more lumber to chop, and I've got more cane to cut. I'm not going to raise Cain, but I'm going to cut some cane, and I'll try to do it with a sweet disposition. Thank
