SENATOR STUHR: That's right. It has all of the states broken down.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what is the amount they say that hunting-related activities bring to Nebraska each year?

SENATOR STUHR: Well, I can tell you the retail sales alone were \$232 million. The total multiplier effect is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, let's just take the retail...

SENATOR STUHR: ...\$411 million.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let's take just the retail so that we won't mix the two up just yet. When they say retail sales, what types of items are included in these hunting-related activities? Would that be vehicles, do you know?

SENATOR STUHR: I wouldn't think so. I think it would probably be hunting gear, equipment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does it say so?

SENATOR STUHR: It does not say, except it does talk about jobs, about 5,000 jobs...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Jobs? Well, that's not money spent...

SENATOR STUHR: ...related...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not money spent directly on hunting, though, is it?

SENATOR STUHR: No. Well, related to the economic impact of hunting.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if somebody worked in a store that also sold hunting equipment, like Kmart or Wal-Mart, then all the money generated by Wal-Mart is included in that figure, because
