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SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...demanding that you get involved, demanding that you take a position to protect their interest, and that's when we're going to have a different type of participation. But I want you to see how I'm willing to uphold my end of this log by myself, and it should let you know how much easier it's going to be on me when others of you have an interest in some of these bills that I also have no interest in. Now you might get cloture on this one, but you won't get cloture on those. Because I doubt that many propositions are going to come through here that will garner 33 votes, and that's what it takes to get cloture. We need to be very serious and circumspect in how we deal with these financial questions. This methodology of circumventing the Legislature is not a wise one. If you accept this bill in its present form, there is no legislative...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...oversight, no accountability.

SPEAKER BROMM: This will be your third time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think...thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think it was John Paul Jones who said, I have not yet begun to fight. I'd like to ask somebody who was there at that time to see if I'm correct. Is Senator Tyson here? I don't see Senator Tyson. I think Senator Kruse knows a lot. I'd like to ask Senator Kruse a question, if he will answer. Oh, here's Senator Tyson. That's okay, Senator Kruse. Senator Tyson, was it your shipmate John Paul Jones who said I have not yet begun to fight?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Was it John Paul Jones who said that on the Bonhomme Richard?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Was it him?

SENATOR TYSON: Yes, it was.
