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SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that's why they probably were losing, huh? If he'd a started fighting, they'd have had a better result. Thank you. I just needed to document that for something else I wanted to say. Thank you, Senator Tyson. Members of the Legislature, I have not yet begun to fight. This ain't gonna be...excuse me, this isn't going to be, like what Winston Churchill said, this is not the end. This is not even the beginning of the end, but perhaps it's the end of the beginning. No, we haven't even gotten into the beginning yet. And I want you to see how a bureaucracy can tie up the Legislature. The Game and Parks Commission has members and they have influence that reaches into this Legislature through those people, and they can help tie it up. Now I'm waiting to see when they're going to dictate to the Legislature how they ought to deal with me, but the Game and Parks Commission may have other bills they want through this Legislature. And if you think this is rough sledding, and I don't think it's anything yet, wait till we get to some of those others, and other bills of a similar nature that are not brought by Game and Parks. I do not think the Legislature has had it soak in yet how serious the situation of the state's finances really is. People feel like we'll float along until May, when the Appropriations Committee puts something out here or whenever they put it out here. This whole session is going to be influenced by those considerations, if I have anything to say or do about it. Maybe when Senator Schrock goes home this after...this evening, and maybe when Senator Stuhr goes home this evening, they will do some thinking, they will have some conversations, and a more reasonable approach than the one they're presenting here will be suggested. But, as this bill stands, there is no way that I would support it. And, remember, I have not yet offered a single amendment. I have been using motions for the purpose of discussing the ramifications of a bill like this. My next stage is going to have to be attacking specific provisions in the bill itself, and maybe the first one will be to try to abolish the habitat stamp and the aquatic stamp. And if they're not abolished, then reduce the cost of a fishing license by the cost of the habitat stamp, reduce the cost of a hunting license...I meant the fishing license by the aquatic stamp, reduce the cost of the hunting license by the cost of the habitat stamp. I'd
