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don't agree with them, I don't have any particular opposition to them, I'm now going to be forced to scrutinize every bill more carefully than had been the case in the past, because there is no way that this much legislation could tumble out here in this short a period of time and have anything approaching the quality that it ought to have.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I don't know whether these committees are running everything out here to try to get as much done before we get into the discussion of the budget and other fiscal matters. Despite the fact that the financial problems of the state obviously are looming over us and dictating the ultimate course of this session, that is no excuse. It is no justification for us to abandon our responsibility to make sure that whatever legislation we do enact is quality, worthwhile legislation. I don't believe that is going to happen if things are allowed to just run through here. When we were debating...when you all were debating Senator Maxwell's proposal...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Time has expired.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schrock, you're recognized.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the amendment that was passed that would delay implementation date, it's not exactly clear that it applies to this new amendment. But the intent that I would have and the intent of the body should be made clear that it applies to the new amendment. So the implementation date, after this amendment, would be delayed until July 1, 2004, which makes it impractical for the Game and Parks to implement a fee increase until the calendar year 2005. I hope that is clarifying enough. With that, I will conclude my remarks.
