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SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Schrock, to a question?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schrock, can you still go in a park one day for \$2.00?

SENATOR SCHROCK: It's \$2.50 at the present time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. So they upped the fee. Thank you. I don't go to the park that I used to go to. I don't go to any of the parks in the state anymore. It reminds me of the wrongfulness of how we do things. I know that whether people attend the parks or not, who are poor, does not mean much to most of my colleagues here. To many of my colleagues, it doesn't matter if the poor have nothing to eat, if the poor have no place to live, if the poor cannot provide medical care for themselves and their children. But that is not the case with me. I'm not as wealthy as many of my colleagues here. I'm probably, if we want to use the term "poor," as a point from which to compare, the poorest one in this Legislature. But I don't believe that the worth of a person is determined by how much he or she possesses in the way of material things. And I would advise all people, no matter how much or little they have, to wear the things of this world loosely. But when it comes to the parks, land should not really belong to anybody in an absolute sense. Land belongs to somebody in close to an absolute sense when the one with the power to control that land tells people, you cannot set foot on this land without penalty of the law unless you give me some money. This land that belongs to nobody, this land over which human beings are to be stewards, not owners, has been converted into a revenue generator.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the ones least able to participate in this bounty, which should belong to all humankind in common,
