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SENATOR CHAMBERS: I am going to fight this bill and, in the same way that there's some rationality manifested itself on the last bill we had, it will do so on this one unless you cloture me. I'm warning you now and I'm giving you fair notice. If all of you all like this bill, don't let me talk anymore, don't let me offer any more amendments, don't let me offer any motions, because I intend to stay on this bill until the cows come home. And if we can't get the cows to the home, we'll move the home to the cows, but those two are going to come together at some point. There are sources of money for helping to underwrite the cost of these parks. Parks are healthful places, and there are places we can get money that we lay...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...aside for healthful activities. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may continue, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, I'd like to ask Senator Schrock a question or two, if I may.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Do you yield to a question, Senator Schrock?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schrock, this...what's the name of that Environmental Trust Fund? Is that the name of it, the Environmental Trust?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that is under the control, or it's under the Game and Parks Commission. Is that right?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I think the administration of it is handled by Game and Parks. They don't actually control it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. The Legislature, though, had to take some action because in the past the chairperson of the
