SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open on your motion to reconsider.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, I will tell you why I'm moving to reconsider. I have another motion. In fact, I have several of them, but if I offer one that I'm very serious about I don't want to get started today. I don't know whether Senator Schrock would agree with it, I don't know whether the body would agree with it, but it relates to having a nonresident fee, to test the water. But I don't want to test it too soon. It may seem, as Senator Bourne pointed out when he came in here, that I'm running out of gas, so I've got to persevere for a couple of more days, and by then people may realize that the reason I'm offering the motion is because it's designed to be a serious approach toward the other side, although they probably will have to reject it. But, regardless of what they ultimately will do, I'm not going to put it up there right now. The possibility of cigarette tax money is not something I'm going to reduce to a motion right now because there are too many things between now and when we get to a point where something like that will seriously be considered is down the way. I am going to do some investigating between now and the time that I would offer such a motion to see how I would craft an amendment that would put a one-cent tax on the cigarettes. I know that the Governor is looking at cigarettes; many people are. Traditionally, I have been opposed in recent years to raising the tax on cigarettes to balance the General Fund budget. I had stated earlier that attending a park can be a healthful activity. There can be a relationship shown between some money derived from cigarette taxes going to maintain parks. That is a wholesome experience, meaning attendance at the park, so I'm going to look seriously at that. Maybe others who are scrambling for that tobacco money will fight it, and if they fight me over a penny, then you know I'm going to fight them over 20 pennies or 30 pennies or however many they're going to try to get. So, as I stated yesterday, these bills deal with fees, but they affect much more. They impact on what we're going to do this session about the state's fiscal situation. I cannot guarantee 25 votes to set aside an additional penny of cigarette tax money for the parks, but I think there could be a greater justification shown for that if money is to be used for
