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will be able to see how many permits are sold at each of these parks. We would be able, if that is given to us, to see which ones have the greatest appeal and we can see how they're maintained to determine if the maintenance is what determines that more people go there, if it's the location of the park that determines that more people go there. And if it's the location, is it in a rural area? Is it in an urban area? Is it in a park near the border between Nebraska and some other state, or just what? And the reason I want to know that, I'm not willing to accept raw numbers that the Game and Parks Commission will give to us because there is no analysis that can be conducted on the basis of those numbers. Senator Schrock might be able to answer one question for me along that line and, Senator Schrock, the question that I would ask you, you may have touched on it before, how many parks in the state charge a fee in order for a person to enter?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I believe there's 86, 86 areas that require the park entry fee or the sticker.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think we can probably agree...I'm not going to hold you to a specific number because I...

SENATOR SCHROCK: That's correct, though. That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...just kind of an idea. Not all parks would have the same level of attendance.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you agree with that?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That is correct. Historically, the historical parks have a tendency to lose money, but they're the ones that I would be most reluctant to close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And they're the ones, then, that have to be subsidized the heaviest by fees that are derived from other parks.
