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amendment. And we had...I had the same exact questions. I wanted to put it on General File here, and if by chance there's some changes or some technicality here we're not looking at, then I want to...obviously, we'll go back on Select File and work with Senator Landis on. I don't see any problems with it myself. It's very clear. It gets rid of all this ambiguous language we had in the statutes prior to this. And I think it's the way to go. And it may very well simplify a lot of issues over there in the Property Assessment Taxation Office. So it's regrettable we didn't have it before now. But I'll be glad to visit with anyone between now and Select File. And Senator Landis and I, probably together, are going to go get some questions answered on this, to make sure that we're not overstating what this does and the ramifications of it. So with that, I would yield my rest of my time back to the Chair. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Landis, followed by Senator Janssen.

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Baker, I just want to make sure I've got this right, because I don't want to overstate things. By the way, the language, I think, doesn't trouble me. I think you said the amendment came from Cathy Lang. Here's my characterization, and you check if I'm wrong. I think the origin of the concern was from Farm Bureau, I'm going to guess. Jay Rempe is...and then it was, how do you get this idea written well, and that went to Cathy, and you got some language from her. But I think it would be fair to say that the motivation behind it, or the desire for the amendment, doesn't emanate with Ms. Lang. She was the drafter. And I think it does come from agricultural interests in the lobby. Is that a fair characterization of where the momentum for the amendment comes from?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Is that a question, Senator Landis?

SENATOR LANDIS: That is...I'm sorry, I meant that to be a question for Senator Baker, and I should have asked.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker.
