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SENATOR BAKER: Yes, that's correct.

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay. Good.

SENATOR BAKER: She actually worked with myself and the Farm Bureau. The bill originally came from the Nebraska Association of County Officials, the assessors, trying to get some help to clean this up.

SENATOR LANDIS: Right. And I...that sounds right to me. This amendment, I think, was drawn because the Farm Bureau wanted greater clarification.

SENATOR BAKER: That's correct.

SENATOR LANDIS: And then to assist them in achieving that, I think, they talked to Cathy Lang and used her expertise. But the origin is from the agricultural interests, and Cathy was there, I think, to help draft. That's...I would guess that's how it happened here.

SENATOR BAKER: That's correct. And I think the actual language came out of a manual, came out of an assessor's manual. So that's...it's not new language, it's simply replacing all this language we can't understand that was in the statutes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you finished, Senator Landis?

SENATOR LANDIS: I am.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Okay. Thank you. Senator Janssen, followed by Senator Beutler.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members. Looking at the amendment, I think there's about three words in there that would help distinguish that from a residence that is being bought other than for agricultural purposes, and that's the physical and functional and the location characteristics. I think the word "functional" is probably the best word in there. Because if you have...if it's for just for an acreage site, the
