PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Time has expired.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...they're going to show us the money?

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Sorry, Senator. Time has expired. Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the body. I want to commend the Government Committee for this bill. There's two very significant issues in here. And while I recognize that they are trying to accommodate a federal mandate, I think they're being aware of two very significant issues in this state, and one is the fact that our voter registration lists at the county level cannot be accurate until we have some kinds of checking process to actually verify when people have moved. Ordinarily, when someone sells their house, there are a number of things they have to do. They're going to go down to the post office, they're going to change their address, but the last thing they might think of is calling their county official, election official, and telling him to remove their name from the voter rolls in that county. And so, in effect, we have voter rolls that contain people who have moved to another county, another municipality long, long ago. Now that has a distinct effect on people when they are trying to bring any kind of initiative in this state, because those are based on percentages of the registered voters. So this kind of a mechanism would make our rolls much more accurate, and those percentages then much more realistic. So I think that's the first issue in this bill that I think is excellent, and I want to commend you, Senator Schimek, and the committee. The other issue I want to bring to your attention is on page 6 where there is a provision in there, protects the privacy of our citizens. We ask them to submit their driver's license number or the last four digits of their Social Security number. There are some states that use a Social Security number on their driver's license. Nebraska is one of the wise ones that does not do so, but, in effect, if someone doesn't have that license we have a provision here for a Social Security number, but it's protected by using only four digits. So, Senator Schimek, thank you very much for your work.
