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SENATOR SCHIMEK: No, that is not in these bills.

SENATOR RAIKES: So if you just focus on these bills, what are the most significant changes?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, there's...in these bills I think that the whole computerized system is the most significant.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. And...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...second to that would be?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I don't know if there is a second to that, Senator.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. Thank you.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Raikes. The Chair recognizes Senator Hudkins.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I'd like to ask Senator Schimek a question, if I may.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. (Laugh)

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Schimek, please.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Senator Schimek, going back to the identifying information, the driver's license and/or the Social Security four digits, I've had a driver's license since I was 16; I've been registered since I was 18 or whenever the appropriate time was. My driver's license number, doesn't it change every...it will be five years now? Do we always have the same driver's license number? I was under the impression that that changed every time we got a new license.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: It's a good question, Senator Hudkins. I don't know the answer to that.
