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committee amendments add additional language to allow the commission to establish what information is needed for permits for hunting, fishing, or harvesting fur, and reinstates language that was inadvertently stricken. The amendment strikes the language in Section 8 and 9 which would have created a separate hunter safety and bow hunter safety program for individuals 21 years of age and older. It also establishes a nonresident owner of land for a limited deer permit at one-half the fee for nonresident permit to hunt deer. There is a technical correction, adding a more correct reference to families of Tayassuidae and Suidae. Families Tayassuidae include wild boars, and the family Suidae includes most other pigs, including domestic pigs. That's my explanation of the committee amendments. If you have any questions, I'd be glad to try and answer.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schrock. You've heard the opening on the committee amendments. Senator Byars, you're recognized.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The...obviously, all of you have been given a tremendous amount of information relative to this issue by Mr. Meints, who happens to be a constituent of mine. The property in question happens to fall in Senator Vrtiska's district. I think both Senator Vrtiska, and I can't put words in his mouth, but both Senator Vrtiska and myself obviously have a concern that Mr. Meints has been treated fairly, he's been treated the same as anyone else would be relative to this issue anywhere else across the state. As you look at the issue on its surface, it would appear that he is being singled out for somewhat special legislation. As you look at the issue more broadly, however, I'm not sure if that's the case. As I have looked at the information shared with us from Game and Parks, and the counterinformation from Mr. Meints, I'm not certain that I have developed an adequate paper trail to be able to substantiate some of the conversations that have taken place in this particular instance. Senator Schrock, would you yield to a question, please?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.
