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interpreting that, but I think if it was better described, perhaps interpretation could be better also. Would you object to that, if we come up with a little better language?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That isn't a problem. As a matter of fact, you have pointed out something that maybe needs to be looked at.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you. I'll get with your staff and see if we can do that between now and then.

SENATOR SCHROCK: All right.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I have...I had a...I have in my district a displaced Texan who still lives here now, but he has brothers and sisters in eastern Texas. And what has happened is, they started out with hunting farms with these wild boars, and it...they don't stay in. They don't stay in. And it's really...these are private farmers in this area, and it really causes...has really caused problems to eradicate them, or kill them, or whatever they have to do. So I rise to support Senator Schrock's ban on these so-called animals within our state.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Senator Byars.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Schrock, would you yield?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes. Yes, I will yield.

SENATOR BYARS: Senator Schrock, without looking, you can help me, so I don't have to, so I can be a little lazy this morning. Did Mr. Meints appear before the committee relative to this legislation?
