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SENATOR BYARS: He would then have the opportunity to divest himself of his existing population...

SENATOR SCHROCK: That is correct.

SENATOR BYARS: ...so he could recoup some of that investment?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes. But we don't believe his inventory is very large now.

SENATOR BYARS: Okay. Thank you very much, Senator Schrock. I'll yield my time back to the Chair.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Byars. Senator Chambers, you're recognized.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm glad that Senator Jensen called attention to that term "unfit." And that will be taken care of. I agree that that section that prohibits the hunting of those boars...that section should stay in the bill. In one of the pieces of information I got from Mr. Meints, he had said that he refers to them as wild just to draw the public's attention, but they really aren't. Then he asked the question, who has ever seen a buffalo, so why do you have the term "buffalo wings?" What a lot of people don't realize is that the word "buffalo" has nothing to do with the animal, but the city of Buffalo, where cooking these wings in that fashion came into being. You'd use sauces, and make them very greasy. So the "buffalo" does not refer to the animal; it refers to the city where the method of preparing these wings first came into being. I have seen commercials where they'll show a buffalo, the critter, with little wings flying the buffalo through the air. But on this idea of having a restricted piece of ground where people do what they call hunting, reinforces what I said about the barbarity, the cruelty, the insensitivity, the bloodthirstiness of so-called hunting. I don't believe it ennoble the spirit. I don't think it teaches respect for living creatures. It certainly does not indicate that human beings are being the good stewards who are to have dominion over the entire universe, as you find in Genesis. I'm sure that dominion did not include treating
