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State Fair. That's what makes it such a general attraction.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Which draws the larger number of competitors, livestock activities or...and if there's a different activity would you tell me what it is?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, they have people who bring the cooking goods, their sewing, their paintings, their drawings, all kinds of activities.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does that draw more people than the livestock competitions?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, when people go to the fair they go for a variety of reasons and they look at and go to many of the exhibits to see what...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I mean participants. Do more people participate in the activities you mention than participate in the livestock activities?

SENATOR VRTISKA: I couldn't answer that. I think it's probably a pretty good cross section.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you. I'm not going to ask Senator Cudaback the question that was put to me that I should ask, and the question was, does Senator Cudaback like the State Fair because it gives him the opportunity to mingle with poor people? But I'm not going to ask that question. Senator "Baron" Tyson ought to ask it if he wants it asked, so I'm not going to ask it. But the comment that Senator Stuthman made is one that I can understand from somebody in a rural area. I can understand all of those things. But why isn't the fair moved closer to the area where the people will be who are going to participate? Why is it on the eastern edge of the state? But those are not questions that are going to be considered. I would wager that this checkoff is going to be unsuccessful. I have one more question to ask Senator Vrtiska, because I don't want to offer any amendments.
