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SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Mr. Speaker and members of the board, I would just like to comment on one of the issues of Senator Chambers'. As far as the people that are in the competition on the local level, on the county level, as far as livestock, baking, cooking, dressmaking or anything like this, every one of those individuals, you know, are not eligible to go to the State Fair and have their entry to the State Fair. There's only the ones that are the top ones, as they're judged in the county fair, are eligible to go to the State Fair. Because a lot of times there will be one, two, or three individuals that won on the county level, those are entries that are accepted at the State Fair because that is the way the counties set things up. They don't want to have to take everything, the whole pickup loads of things, to the State Fair. Only the best from the counties go to the State Fair. So I just wanted to make that comment. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Don Pederson.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I haven't spoken on this bill before. I spent considerable time in concern about the State Fair itself. I think it's in much better control than it ever has been, in my memory. But I am concerned still about the economics of the whole thing. Senator Chambers, I would like to inquire of you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Happily.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Senator Chambers, are you aware of the fiscal circumstances of the State Fair; that is, who owns the land, who owns the buildings, matters of that sort?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, the people who operate the fair, it seems to me, would...well, no, I don't.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Okay. Did you know that the land there is
