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front of, I said, do you go to the State Fair, and in three or four speaking engagements that I did over a few weeks I had one hand go up, and that was someone who didn't live in my district. It doesn't draw from all over the state like you would think it would, or for people even just a little over 50 miles away. So a lot of what we do only serves very narrow populations, I accept that, but this is not something that is going to keep people from...who are disabled from getting a service, it's not going to help the aging get their services in their home, and it's not going to help our prison guards be safe in their protection of our prisoners, it's not going to be a state trooper on the road. So those are the things that are my priorities in the budget, and we may not all share the same priorities,...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...but I think we have to go to those first.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My time to Senator Chambers, please.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I'm glad Senator Thompson explained why she withdrew her amendment, and if she doesn't offer it on Select File I probably will. I hope the bill does not get that far. I had no idea, before being enlightened by Senator Don Pederson, that the state owns the land, the state owns the buildings. I'd like to ask Senator Vrtiska a question.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Vrtiska, were you aware of the information that Senator Don Pederson gave me about the state owning the land and the buildings and whatnot?
