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SENATOR CUDABACK: True.

SENATOR VRTISKA: You know, that is the part that bothers me, because do we need to give agencies excess funding now at a time when we don't have any money? I mean, I'm in favor of increasing these fees. I think it's the right thing to do. But I think some of these are...when you talk about tripling the fees, it almost...it's a little scary. Because as Senator Stuthman said, somebody's got to pay this bill. And it's going to be the consumer. That's the bottom line. They're the ones that are going to have to absorb these costs. The costs that will be driven up through the inspection fees and et cetera is going to end up down out of the pockets of the person who is required to get these inspections, or necessarily has these inspections. So I would concur with my colleagues that spoke before me. We need to move rather cautiously, and perhaps have some dialog. Is...can this be adjusted so that we wouldn't have such a radical change? Now, I understand it's been 16 years, as Senator Cudaback said, since these fees have been changed. If I was to be critical at all, it would be that somewhere along that line they didn't come in with something and not have such an excessive amount of fees all at one time, because that, obviously, catches the attention of the public, when we see these dramatic increases all at once. And so certainly I'm not going to tell these agencies how to run their business, but it would appear to me, had they made some slight adjustments as they saw they were not going to have enough funds, it would have been much more acceptable in the sight of many of us, in that manner, than to have such an excessive increase. Now, another question for Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Cudaback, do you know, or do you have any idea...this is the maximum they go. Do they intend to move clear up to that level?

SENATOR CUDABACK: No. What it...only what it takes.
