SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR JONES: Yes. Would you be willing to say that this total fee that we're asking for here to end at certain time? Probably maybe go to 2007. Who knows how far it will go. But would you be willing to let them say, well, you can have a certain percent each year? Or do you think it still should be left in the power of the board to decide how much they need each year? Or can we put a percentage on with an amendment? Or what do you think about an idea like that?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I don't know how to answer that, Senator. I can say, we can micromanage. If this body wants to micromanage that board, we can. We can...statute...the Governor appoints these seven members to run it. We have an executive director, Mr. Carlson, became ill and had to resign, unfortunately. He's a very good man, and...I won't go into the story, but he had to resign. And that's another story. But we currently have a guy in charge now, appointed. And if we want to micromanage him, that's fine, if we want to do that. Do we want...are we in that game? I don't know. But we do set a limit. So we are kind of micromanaging, you might say, there, because we're saying, we don't trust you to put...we don't...well, you understand.

SENATOR JONES: Another question that I might have. Senator Janssen said something about, it's commercial buildings and buildings with public use. Now, do they go out and inspect homes that I would have built...it wasn't mentioned that, and mostly just for public use?

SENATOR CUDABACK: We're not changing anything in the...we're just changing the fees. We're not restructuring. What they currently do in that line, that's all there. And that's another whole matter. This is just strictly fees, Senator Jones. It's nothing to do with...this doesn't change what they inspect, where they inspect, nothing to do with that. Just strictly dollars.

SENATOR JONES: I was just wondering about something else, that we get journeymen out there and we get contractors out there.
