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And I was wondering if we could have extra training for the contractors and they could handle this position without the state inspectors of 12 or 15.

SENATOR CUDABACK: This bill still requires training. Still requires training. The state may not have to do the four-hour thing before, come out and tell you, you know, prep you. They probably will, but that...it still requires training. That...you know, you still have to be qualified...I mean, take a test. All that stuff is still there.

SENATOR JONES: Could the contractors take a test good enough to do the job that the inspector's doing?

SENATOR CUDABACK: As I say, it doesn't change what...

SENATOR JONES: That don't change that...

SENATOR CUDABACK: What makes them qualified now will...they'll still be qualified, in other words. If this passes, they still have to be qualified. It doesn't change that. And that's...if you want to do that, that's another whole bill.

SENATOR JONES: Okay. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. The Chair recognizes Senator Synowiecki, followed by Senator Wehrbein and Senator Janssen.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Cudaback, I have a question for you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: As a member of the Appropriations Committee, basically, cash funded agencies, general funded agencies, they're all monitored relatively closely, aren't they, by the Appropriations Committee?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yeah. Sure.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: If these fees are found to be excessive
