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the notice. Well, the word "occurs", to me and I think to you, is somewhat ambiguous. Did it occur when it first occurred, or did it occur if any part of it still exists at the date of the notice? So all this does is change one word, "occurs," to "begins." So date of the notice, first one that begins after that. Everybody can understand that. Makes it clear for the employers. I think it's good for the employers, but should not be...it should not handicap the processing of rapid payments. That's all it's about. I recommend its adoption to you.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Chair recognizes Senator Jensen.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Certainly the whole purpose in this is to get dollars to those who need it, the family and to the children, and...but there is some ambiguity there and I can understand where Senator Beutler is coming from. It all depends on where in that pay period that the order would come down, and so to use the word "begins" rather than "occurs" I think is acceptable, so I would vote green on this amendment.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I also support this amendment and I appreciate the fact that Senator Beutler brought it, because I was trying to figure how language could be contrived to give some degree of notice to everybody who would be involved, including the employer. So this that Senator Beutler offers I think is probably what Solomon did not have to do, which is to cut a baby in half and give one half to each of the contending parties. Senator Beutler managed not only to keep the baby intact but, at the same time, to offer something to everybody, so he may be Senator "Solomon" for a period of time, in keeping with my practice of giving nicknames to my colleagues. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? Seeing none, the Chair recognizes Senator Beutler to close.
