Interest rate is the T-bill rate plus one percent. I don't know what the T-bill rate is today, but it's not...it's not a high rate, for sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you are aware that this would require the imposition of interest in every support order, if it's a part of the definition of "support."

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right. Now I would like to ask Senator Brashear a question or two, if he is prepared to answer.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, you have done extensive work with the entire area of child support. Is that true?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: I've worked hard at it, Senator Chambers. I don't want you to put me in the position of being some sort of an expert.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right, you worked hard at it, but you worked hard enough at it and long enough at it to have a familiarity with this area of the law and how...and what is...

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...entailed in orders.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, sir, and I'm ably assisted.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, would you explain how this would work if the language is left in the law requiring "interest" as a part of the definition of "support," and what would be available for a court to do if this language is stricken?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, I will.
