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SENATOR LANDIS: Fair enough.

SENATOR BEUTLER: In fact, I wasn't even going to mention the report unless you had already mentioned it in debate. But I do want to talk about the report, so let's do that to the extent that you're able to do that.

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay, the NAIC reviews the efforts of state departments because they are...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Is this both banking and insurance?

SENATOR LANDIS: No.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Is this both banking...this is banking.

SENATOR LANDIS: This is insurance only.

SENATOR BEUTLER: This is insurance only.

SENATOR LANDIS: Right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: So is there a parallel accreditation report for banking that is putting the same pressure on us?

SENATOR LANDIS: There isn't a parallel problem on accreditation for banking. There is a parallel problem of the ability to retain and pay examiners a rate that allows us to do the work. We are in, essentially, the same situation of having the examination schedule pushed to the very, very limit of statutory compliance.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, so in terms of external pressure, though, such as an accreditation institution, there is not an emergency with regard to the banking part of this bill, right, other than what one may...

SENATOR LANDIS: Not an external, there is an internal. We have a commitment by our statutes to examine banks, and we are now at the very, very furthest most reach of complying with our own statutes, which I would regard as equally a significant effect.
