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tax dollars, especially at this...these hard times. Sure, Cabela's send a lot of stuff out of state, so does Omaha Steak. I don't know why. They get about ten times more for their steaks than anybody else does, but that's another matter. So I think that we're on the right...and I'm going to support this, because nothing ventured, nothing gained. Department of Revenue has worked on this quite hard for a number of years now. Ms. Egr has been to a lot of meetings throughout the country on this issue and it's big, big dollars there, and I believe that we owe that to the people in this state who are collecting those taxes and actually not getting paid for collecting the taxes anymore. And why should someone from out of state send products in here and there's no state tax on it? What are...this is probably not the final solution, but, by gosh, it's a start and I think we should pursue it and listen to Senator Landis and the Revenue Committee on how we're going to accomplish that. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Wehrbein, followed by Senators Brashear, Landis, and Smith. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I tend to agree with nearly every comments that other speakers have made to the extent that we probably ought to be cautious, but I do say we ought to move forward in this and we all ought to become intimately familiar, if you will, with the details of this bill, so that we do understand. And I intend to spend some time studying it and probably asking questions. My concern, I think we have to look at the really big picture, and the really big picture is we have main street business across this state that are being...are in competition with...and they're paying property taxes and so forth, and they're in competition with mail-order people in general, not mail order, but Internet sales, all of these that, in essence, aren't supporting those local services that many are taking for granted. So I've watched this develop over the last several years and I know that there are some details that will probably...the devil is in the details is the phrase many of us use, but that we're going to have to work through because we probably are going to run. If my memory is right, there's 7,700 taxing jurisdictions,
