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that are trying to make in on main street and providing local support to their communities, versus those that are shopping on the Internet. And so I think it's...my point really is we've got to pursue this and discover where the issues are, discover where the fine points are. I assume, as I look through this, I don't know where agriculture exemptions are treated in this. Perhaps, Senator Landis, you would...not so much agriculture in this case but how exemptions that we may have, how that would fit into the...to this over...how it would fit in across the United States, how Nebraska's or Iowa's or any other's exemptions would be treated. As we join that, would we be forced in? Would it be recognized? How much standardization will there have to be? I guess those are questions we all need to understand in the big picture, as much as anything. But I'm glad to see this coming forward and I don't know what the timetable is on this, I didn't find that yet, but it definitely has to be discussed and we all have to understand it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion, Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I...it was not timing that I had just tried to arouse your interest to the point of where I was going to give you the one real meaty example on which you could put a hook. It just...that was just five minutes and I just ran out, but let me go back. Remember, this is a voluntary effort by all these states and we have to get...that's why I used the phrase if, as, and when. But you can be making decisions. If you decide to go forward in this Streamlined Project for all of the right reasons, if we get there, you're making decisions as you go, and the specific example I was going to give you is that this contains, or will require us, to adhere to a very narrow definition of snack foods. And I can put an approximate number on it. If you take the broad definition of snack foods, that's not only pop, candy and gum, but also cookies, cakes, doughnuts and chips, that's a \$22 million item for revenue. If you take the narrow definition that would be applicable and controlling by reason of the Streamlined Project, snack foods are only pop, candy and gum, and that's \$12 million. So right there, trying to be helpful to all of us and you, I've identified that's a
