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SENATOR SMITH: Okay. And I can understand Nebraska wanting to collect the mail-order sales tax of Nebraskans. There's no motivation whatsoever, I would think, in Oregon, who has no sales tax, to collect our tax for us.

SENATOR LANDIS: Well, Oregon as a state may or may not choose to participate. On the other hand,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...you may have a Wal-Mart or a JCPenney or a Nike saying to their state, look, we want to participate and we want the states who are here, and we want to buy this software. We want to be a part of this program and, by the way, we'd like to have that apply, you know, across. So there may be some political pressure. But, in answer to your question, I think it would be fair to say a state that had no sales tax would have limited rationale to join the project.

SENATOR SMITH: And I would say, henceforth, they would be the mecca for every mail-order company in America.

SENATOR LANDIS: No, the mail-order company does not benefit one bit. In other words, a mail-order company that's now in Oregon is already supposed to be giving us the sales tax from our people. They don't get...because Oregon doesn't collect taxes doesn't mean that an Oregon mail-order company isn't supposed to send Nebraska taxes back to Nebraska, because a Nebraskan...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...ordered from Oregon. So this will not create some area of benefits by being outside the Streamlined Project. That's doesn't occur.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Landis. Senator Smith, your time is up. Sorry. Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature. Senator Landis, if I can get you off the phone, could you...
