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Revenue Committee, for example? I'd love to see you on that, as Chair of the Revenue Committee. And if we did something like that, at least we would control the representative body, and by that means control the vote that we have. Those are my questions.

SENATOR LANDIS: Sure.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: You presaged...my light is on, so if it takes a little more time, I'll get to it when I can. You presaged a conversation we had in the Revenue Committee. One of the things we asked was, you know, should there be more than one representative? And we did think that there should be a legislative representative, because we wanted to make sure that there was an input on...both from the streamline back to Nebraska, and from Nebraska to the streamline project, of what Nebraska tax policy is. We then thought, well, gosh, there are two representatives, why not three? And then we thought, (laugh) this is representative of the eight members of the Revenue Committee, who felt, well, that's just sending a third person along with an airplane ticket so that they can be a tiebreaker, because the other two can't work it out. Let's not be buying any more airplane tickets than we need to. Let's just send two of them and just figure that they're going to be able to work together and work it out. So in fact, we said, we didn't decide...we didn't use a tiebreaker kind of a third presence. We did think that there were two aspects. One was...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...a...okay. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Sorry. Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I wanted to speak the other day, and just applaud Senator Landis for bringing this bill forward. I think I'm among many of the senators who their local constituents are wondering why aren't we taxing our Internet sales? I have retail people...for
