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help flesh out that provision.

SENATOR BEUTLER: To some extent, this reminds me of the mother that says, well, if you don't like the rules, son, go live someplace else. Well, kid is never going to go live someplace else, obviously. He doesn't really have the means of doing that. And if this agreement is effective, this kid here in Nebraska...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...really isn't going to have the ability to do anything else. The...let me understand a little better, Senator Landis, the likely nature of the ten members who would be the first ten members. Is it fair to assume that they would be people more on the losing end of the current proposition, that is, those who have fewer Land's Ends in their district, in their states? Or does it have any east, west, central, any sort of geographic political connotation? I mean, who...

SENATOR LANDIS: You're asking me something I don't know, but I could find out. But I'll tell you what I knew...know. All states are losers. All states are losers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: And the reason is that no state is able to enforce beyond its borders...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Landis. I'm sorry. Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Jones, followed by Senator Bromm, Beutler, and Landis.

SENATOR JONES: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. This sounds like a good idea, and I'm really behind what he's doing. But I do have a few questions for Senator Landis, if he wouldn't mind.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Landis, would you respond to a question from Senator Jones?
