that now are being measured by the Supreme Court, who have said, there's so much burden to retailers and so little benefit to the states or the taxing jurisdictions that we will not compel retailers to do this because of that difference. And when we get to a place where it's easy to comply and the benefits are significant, we may leave the time when it's voluntary and may be able to make it...

SENATOR JONES: Mandatory.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...an obligation, mandatory. But that...we will have to pass through a rather significant period of time before we'd ever get to that. But ultimately, by the way, that latter suggestion, the latter rule is exactly what Nebraska has tried to do three or four times with respect to mail-order catalog sales. This Legislature has, I think at least three times, passed a statute making it mandatory for mail-order catalog companies to pay a sales tax. And every time, they take it to court and beat the state. But we...that's been our public policy for years. We just can't make it stick, Jim.

SENATOR JONES: Yes. One other question that I have. There's ten states that are trying...you know, in this state of Nebraska, if you...a retailer can keep a little bit, or portion, for their business, and they send the rest of the sales tax to the state. Is the other ten states that's doing it trying to keep that...is that all going to be the same across all the states? I mean, if I order something from another state, he can keep a little portion for his business that's...because he applied in Nebraska? Or are all ten of them going to try to be the same?

SENATOR LANDIS: I'm going to tell you my off-the-top-of-my-head answer, then I'll see if I can track it down, and that is, that is a piece of the puzzle that is currently in flux and being discussed. And when the ten states get together, they'll try to make a rule that is...that's useful for them. There...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...is an acknowledgment that compensation for
