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SENATOR STUTHMAN: Yes, I would say that would be accurate. But those 12 or 14 counties that are in the process of establishing their plan, they are not able to issue anything, and nothing can be constructed or put in those counties during the process of the development of the plan.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: So what does that mean for these junkyards then that might be out there? Do they.. can they regulate them at all then during that process?

SENATOR STUTHMAN: The junkyards that are there at the present time are really grandfathered in and there really isn't anything that you can do. The only thing with this plan is, any new constructions that are put in the county, from the time they have adopted a resolution on the county level as to whether they wanted to develop a comprehensive plan or not. And if that resolution was passed, then that plan is practically in place, and nothing can be permitted to be built at that time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I appreciate your help on this. Thank you very much.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek, Senator Stuthman. Senator Beutler, you're next.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I'd waive for the moment, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Beutler waives off. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, members of the body. Senator Stuthman, can I ask you a question? Since you just left the county (laugh) into this higher paying job, ..

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: I see that the state charged a permit of \$50.
