SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Byars.

SENATOR BYARS: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Byars, now, would you explain to me again exactly if...how this works? If someone was smoking in a nonsmoking area and left, and someone complained to the owner of the establishment, you know, that there was smoke in there and he didn't like it, so then what does the law enforcement do?

SENATOR BYARS: I think it's a hanging offense. I'm not sure.
(Laughter)

SENATOR JANSSEN: Hanging?

SENATOR BYARS: I believe it's something like that.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Upside-down, or...?

SENATOR BYARS: That's yet to be determined by rules and regulations in the Department of Licensure, quite honestly. The...as I understand it, those rules and regs are still to be promulgated. And I'll check with committee counsel on that. There are different rules and regulations, and I was incorrect when I said those rules and regs had not been written. They were put into effect as of January 15. There are rules and enforcement that apply to violators, those people who, in effect, go in and smoke in a nonsmoking area. And there are rules that apply to those who own the facilities, or who are...have possession of those facilities where you smoke. Now, exactly what the enforcement is on that, Senator Janssen, I'm not sure.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Byars. Colleagues, I think we should spend a little time on this bill. Because I'm...there's too many unanswered questions here, in my opinion. Who is going to be liable? Is the proprietor going to have to bear part of that burden? Or is it only the offender that smoked in a nonsmoking area? I'm not...I hope there's some more discussion on this. I'm not clear on exactly what we're getting
