SENATOR THOMPSON: I...that's current law, so...yeah.

SENATOR BOURNE: Right. But...it is current law, but instead of making it just apply to the smoker, we're now applying it to the business.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. So any affected party...

SENATOR THOMPSON: Well,...

SENATOR THOMPSON: It may or may not be a business. It would be any public place.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. So what could happen now is, any affected party, someone who's sensitive to smoke, could file an injunction against any business if there was smoke in the premises when there shouldn't be smoke in there, if they're subject to the indoor air act?

SENATOR THOMPSON: If they're subject to the...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...Clean Indoor Air Act, and they did...well, let's say...okay, just...I'm going to put my light on. We can...why don't you turn to page 5, or...do you have the green copy?

SENATOR BOURNE: I have the green copy here.

SENATOR THOMPSON: So it says, where smoking areas are designated, existing physical barriers and ventilation systems shall be used to minimize the toxic effect. No public place other than a bar or restaurant having a serving area of less than 1,200 square feet shall be designated as a smoking area in
