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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Byars, you are recognized to speak.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Senator Schimek. And I would reinforce what Senator Thompson has said. This is very broad. Maybe with the conversation, the dialog we're having this morning, maybe it's too broad and we need to revisit it. And I think that's the pledge that we as a committee are making to all of the parties involved. This shouldn't be a bill buster. It's something that can be worked with. You know, I don't like things not to be closely defined any more than anyone else. And as I read this and as it's being interpreted to me by legal counsel, you don't have to prove you're an asthmatic or you have emphysema. You don't have to do anything. If you want to go to the court, if you want to take that time and have that effort to go the court to seek injunctive relief, you can do it if you're just offended by walking into a place where there's not supposed to be smoking. And all public places are already affected by this, whether it be a bowling alley or a library or a hospital or whatever. All public places are affected. And I would ask those individuals that do have concerns, we'll work with you, and let's move this bill forward. And I'm sure that all of this can be worked out by Select File.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Thompson, your light is next. Senator Thompson waives. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you Mr. President (sic), members I appreciate Senator...excuse me, Senator...or, thank you, Senator Schimek, members. I appreciate Senator Byars' comments. But you know, I served for three years on the Judiciary Committee with Senator Chambers and Senator Brashear, and I learned there that, you know, don't let language that you're uncomfortable with pass. And I tell you, I think that this is so broad that it's just fraught with peril, I think would be an appropriate term. Let me give you an example, as I read this. And I'll give some time to Senator Thompson if she wants to clarify. But as I understand this, the law would now apply to enforcement against businesses. Before, it only applied to the smoker. And Senator Thompson's nodding in agreement. So before, any affected party could have...could file an injunction against a
