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this bill.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek, you're recognized. This is your third time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. Mr. President and members, Senator Chambers has made me feel very badly here this morning, because I waived off my time earlier so that I would be able to respond better later. And so I need to yield my time to Senator Chambers. (Laugh) Okay. He doesn't really want it.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers, you're declining time that's offered to you? Is that...do I understand that? (Laughter)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker, being the gentleman that I am, being collegial as I am, not only am I declining her time, but if she needs additional time, she lets me know, and I will yield her some of mine when I come up.

SPEAKER BROMM: I just wanted to be clear. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I really hate to get into a legal tangle with Senator Chambers, because I have a lot of respect for his abilities and his knowledge of the State Constitution and the law. And Senator Chambers, I really think that what we're trying to accomplish here is the right thing. I really believe that we need to clarify and make evident. And if I thought there were any way that we could work with you on the language, I'm sure Senator McDonald...and it is her bill...I'm sure that she would be happy to work with you. But my sense is that we can't change the language to make you happy. Is that correct, Senator Chambers?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Probably. Because my quarrel is not just with the language; it's with putting something like this in the constitution, however it is worded. So you're correct.
