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are those officers named in this provision of the constitution. That's clear. Then the Legislature will come along and say, nobody can be the head of one of those offices other than those named in the constitution. That's what it says already. This provision of the constitution does not implicate anybody connected with a political subdivision. It has nothing to do with political subdivisions whatsoever. This language does not define...this new language that's proposed, it does not define a political subdivision. If this language were adopted, it's saying that an employee of a political subdivision is not a person who can be placed over one of these executive offices. That's what it's saying, because it limits its application to this section. It says, for purposes of this section an employee of a political subdivision not holding elective office shall not be considered an executive officer. Well, they're not considered that anyway. Those at the local level have nothing to do whatsoever with these state offices. You're saying nothing. That's why I said you ought to pass a statute if you're trying to qualify people to be allowed to run for a particular office. But I tell you what I'm going to do. I have made my point. I'm going to let you have your folly. Do what you want to do. If this is what you think you ought to do, do it. But here's what you're saying. The only one can hold...be the head of an executive department of government is an executive officer. And here's what you're saying by your language.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: A head...a person who works for a political subdivision cannot be the head of one of these state executive offices. Well, we know that, because that's what the language that's there says already. "In Praise of Folly" was a treatise written by a man named Erasmus. It might be good to read that. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. In reviewing the State Constitution here.. and I'll go back to my assertion that I believe that the regents are a political
