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tourist attractions. That cumulative effect over time means that their tourist attractions get better and better, and ours get staler a staler, because we're not investing, and we continue to lose out. And I don't know about you, but I'm tired of going to hotels and motels in New York and other places of the country and getting our pocket picked and then, when those people come here to Nebraska, we're not taxing them at nearly as high a rate. So if you want to develop the tourist industry, and I think that that's one thing that we really need to do in this state because there is some considerable potential there, and I would strenuously argue with respect to rural Nebraska, and of course this bill gives...doesn't mandate but gives the opportunity to rural Nebraska to engage itself further in tourism, but I think that tourism is one of those supplemental industries that can assist agriculture in the rural communities in keeping viable communities out and around the countryside. I passed out a couple of charts to you that I happened to have in my file. One of them you might want to look at. It's called lodging tax revenues for the states...for the state and counties, at the top, and it shows you, by county, what a 2 percent lodging tax brings in. Now, the reason we have these figures is because you'll recall there's already a 2 percent lodging tourism promotion tax, and it happens that all these counties on the list have chosen to have that tax. What Senator Hartnett is proposing is that they would have the choice of having an additional 2 percent, not...which would not go to promotion but which would go to actual facilities improvement, creating tourist attractions, enhancing tourist attractions. But that's also 2 percent, like the already in existence promotion tax is, so by looking at this chart you can see approximately what your counties would raise by levying an additional 2 percent tax. Now I think you can just count a whole number of situations across the state where there are viable opportunities to promote tourism and increase revenues to particular counties, and I almost hesitate to mention it, but the Kearney Arch is one of them. You know, they've reestablished their financial situation. They are going to be viable. It exists. We need...it draws in people from out of state. We need to make it work, and I know that they want to make it work, and this lodging tax, for example, would be available to Buffalo County, if...
