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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...history, traditions. So you might have somebody as pale as anybody in here, who might say he or she is Hispanic, because of cultural ties. So the term "Hispanic" does not designate a race, but an element of ethnicity. And it does not cover all people who speak Spanish and have certain cultural practices and traditions in common. "Latino," "Latina" are words that don't embrace all Spanish-speaking people. "Chicano," "Chicana" are not words that embrace all Spanish-speaking people. In this area, there is fuzzy thinking, there is fuzzy language. But the fuzziness is all right, because when you sense that a person belongs to one of those groups,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...discrimination is what will happen. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, there are no other lights on. You're recognized to close on FA1161, if you care to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I have an amendment that is coming up on the desk. And while it comes, I will tell you what it deals with. My amendment as drafted is incorrect. People don't pay attention around here. Cities and villages do not adopt resolutions, but ordinances. So what I have to do now is amend my amendment. And such being the case, I'm not going to take any more time at this point, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Mr. Clerk, item on the desk?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to amend his amendment by striking the word "resolution" and inserting the word "ordinance." (FA1163, Legislative Journal page 556.)
