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SENATOR CUDABACK: One...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...said something in...

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...one minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...condemnation of what I had done, and it was carried on television, you think the World-Herald wouldn't print that? This was not an unsupported allegation. And the World-Herald has printed stories about people that were negative with far less than this. So the World-Herald is not a righteous newspaper. I don't know what their position would be on the issue I'm talking about when it comes to sexual orientation. But they certainly are not a newspaper that crusades on behalf of young women who are out there in the workplace being fondled by public officials, old men probably with grandchildren her age, who ought to know better. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may continue, Senator Chambers, on your FA1163 to FA1161.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And, Mr. President, in case...

SENATOR CUDABACK: This will be your third time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...people want to be aware of what that amendment is, it would strike the word "resolution" and insert "ordinance," because villages and cities do not pass resolutions; they pass ordinances. And the ordinance would be a prohibition against employment discrimination based on sexual orientation. Now back to what I was talking about, so that I can give the rest of the story. This young woman came over to the table. And I'm not going to go into every detail, because the article appeared in Saturday's paper and you can get it. And some pictures were taken with the young girl. Somebody made remarks, is that a girl robin or a boy robin? So one of these rascals, when he was close, felt her breast and said, it's a girl robin.
