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do the right thing; as difficult as possible to do the wrong thing. The World-Herald did the wrong thing by sitting on that story, but they did the right thing, regardless of their motive, after I put a little heat to them. So I believe in the efficacy of heat. You can take an old bloody steak, Senator Connealy, and hold it up in the room, and there would be blood dripping all over everything and people would be turned off. They might even gag. But you let me take that old bloody steak, Senator Connealy, and you let me heat a griddle to the right temperature and you let me put some seasonings on that old bloody steak and subject it to the ministrations of heat, and then let me bring out something that smells delicious, so delicious, in fact, it would tempt...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...my colleague, Senator Preister. He might even say this bears looking into, because of the efficacy of heat. Now, if moral heat can be applied to people, if it can be sustained, maintained and even turned up a notch or two, sometimes appropriate action will be forthcoming. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the closing on FA1163. That amendment is to FA1161, to LB 52. All in favor of adoption of FA1163 vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on the adoption of FA1163, offered by Senator Chambers to FA1161. The question before us is adoption of FA1163, amendment to the amendment to LB 52. Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I would ask for a call of the house, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Question for the body is, shall the house go under call? All in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 23 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, to place the house under call.
